An Act to further amend the Workmen's Compensation Act, 1911.

[*Assented to, November 20th, 1919.*]

BE it Enacted by the Governor of the State of South Australia, with the advice and consent of the Parliament thereof, as follows:

1. (1) This Act may be cited alone as the "Workmen's Compensation Act Further Amendment Act, 1919." Short titles.

(2) The Workmen's Compensation Acts, 1911 and 1918, and this Act may be cited together as the "Workmen's Compensation Acts, 1911 to 1919."

2. This Act is incorporated with the other Acts mentioned in section 1 of this Act, and those Acts and this Act shall be read as one Act. Incorporation with other Acts.

3. Paragraph (1) of the First Schedule to the Workmen's Compensation Act, 1911 (as amended by the Workmen's Compensation Act Amendment Act, 1918) is further amended by striking out sub-paragraph (b) thereof, and substituting the following sub-paragraph— Amendment of First Schedule to principal Act—
Amount of compensation in case of incapacity for work.

(b) where total or partial incapacity for work results from the injury, a weekly payment during the incapacity not exceeding—

- i. fifty per centum of his average weekly earnings during the previous twelve months, if he has been so long employed; but if not, then for any less period during which he has been in the employment of the same employer; or
- ii. Thirty

11. Thirty Shillings if he is at the time of the accident a single man, and Two Pounds if he is at the time of the accident a married man,

whichever amount is the greater, but

- (i.) the total liability of the employer in respect of such payments shall not exceed Five Hundred Pounds, and
- (ii.) the workman shall not be entitled to receive by way of weekly payment under subdivision 11. hereof a greater sum than his average weekly earnings during such period as aforesaid.

In the name and on behalf of His Majesty, I hereby assent to this Bill.
