

AN ACT to further amend "The Immigration A.D. 1882. Act, 1855." [6 November, 1882.]

BE it enacted by His Excellency the Governor of Tasmania, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council and House of Assembly, in Parliament assembled, as follows:-

3 At every meeting of the Board Four Commissioners shall form a Quorum of quorum; and in case the votes are equal on any question, the President Commissioners shall have a casting vote.

Appointment of Officers.

4 The Board shall from time to time, as occasion may require, nominate, and the Governor in Council appoint, a Secretary and such Agents, Clerks, and Officers as may be necessary; and there shall be paid to such Secretary, Agents, Clerks, and Officers such salaries and allowances out of the moneys at the disposal of the Board as the Governor in Council sees fit.

Every person appointed to any office under the Board and holding such office when this Act takes effect, shall be deemed to have been lawfully appointed to such office.

Rules and Regulations.

5 The power conferred upon the Board by the Sixth Section of the said Act shall extend to the making Rules and Regulations for—

Fixing the price to be paid by the purchasers of Bounty Tickets, which price shall not exceed—

For single adults, male or female, the sum of Five Pounds:

For married couples, and their children under Twelve years of age at the date of embarkation, the sum of Fifteen Pounds:

For married couples without children exceeding the age of Twelve months, the sum of Ten Pounds:

Every child above the age of Twelve years at the date of embarkation shall be deemed to be an adult.

All Rules and Regulations made by the Board under the said Act or this Act shall be submitted to and be approved by the Governor in Council, and until submitted and approved shall be of no force or effect.

Appropriation of £30,000 for Immigration purposes.

6 Out of moneys provided by Parliament for that purpose there shall and may be appropriated, issued, and applied, a sum of Thirty thousand Pounds (£30,000), in addition to any moneys now at the disposal of the Board, for the purpose of assisting Immigration to *Tasmania* during the years 1883, 1884, and 1885, under the Rules and Regulations made by the Board, and in defraying all other expenses incurred by the Board in carrying into effect the objects and intentions of this Act, and not otherwise.

Repeal. 31 Vict. No 26. 7 Sections One, Four, and Five of the said Act, and Section Two of "The Immigration Act, 1867," are hereby repealed, but such repeal shall not affect anything duly done thereunder before this Act takes effect.

Acts to be read together.

8 The said Act, as amended by this Act, and this Act, shall be read and construed together as one Act.
