

AN ACT to amend the Amusements Duties Act, 1916. A.D. 1927.
[17 December, 1927.]

BE it enacted by His Excellency the Governor of Tasmania, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council and House of Assembly, in Parliament assembled, as follows :—

1—(1) This Act may be cited as “The Amusements Duties Act, 1927,” and shall come into operation on the first day of January, one thousand nine hundred and twenty-eight. Short title and commencement.

(2) The Amusements Duties Act, 1916, is herein called “the Principal Act.” Principal Act, 7 Geo. V. No. 31.

2 Section Fourteen of the Principal Act, is hereby amended by expunging Paragraph iii. thereof, and substituting the following paragraph therefor :—

“ iii. That the amusement is provided for the entertainment of the pupils of a school, or of such pupils and their relatives and friends, or for the benefit or in the interests of such pupils.

For the purposes of this paragraph ‘ school ’ means a school registered under the Registration of Teachers and Schools Act, 1906, and a school within the meaning of the Education Act, 1885.”

3 The schedule to the Principal Act is hereby amended as follows :—

i. By expunging Paragraph 1 thereof, and substituting the following paragraph therefor :—

“ 1. Where the payment, excluding the amount of duty, exceeds One Shilling—

(a) For every Sixpence or fractional part of Sixpence of such payment One Halfpenny.

(b) Member's or season ticket, for every Sixpence or fractional part of Sixpence of the price of such ticketOne Halfpenny.”

and

ii. By expunging Paragraph 2 thereof.
