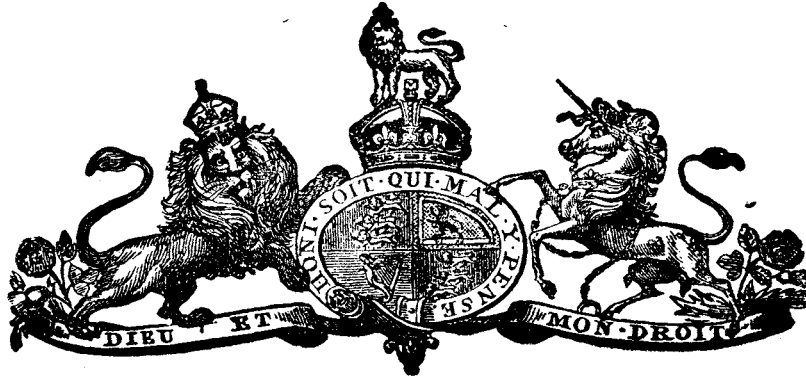

AN ACT to provide for the Fitting Observance of Anzac Day as a National Holiday.

A.D. 1929.

[18 January, 1930.]

BE it enacted by His Excellency the Governor of Tasmania, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council and House of Assembly, in Parliament assembled, as follows:—

1 This Act may be cited as "The Anzac Day Observance Act, Short title. 1929."

2 The twenty-fifth day of April in each year shall be observed as a national holiday, and shall be known as "Anzac Day."

**3**—(1) No person or organisation shall hold or conduct any horse-racing meeting on Anzac Day.

Penalty : Fifty Pounds.

(2) No person shall hold or conduct in any place of public entertainment within the meaning of the Places of Public Entertainment Act, 1917, any theatrical exhibition or entertainment, or any exhibition of moving pictures at any time on Anzac Day before the hour of half-past six of the clock in the afternoon of such day.

Penalty : Fifty Pounds.

**4**—(1) For the purposes of the Licensing Act, 1902, Anzac Day shall be regarded as subject in every respect to all the provisions of that Act relating to Good Friday, and shall be observed by all persons accordingly.

(2) Where under the provisions of the Licensing Act, 1902, the doing or permitting of any act, or the failure to do any act, matter, or thing, is constituted an offence if the same occurs on Good Friday, or within any specified hours on Good Friday, the same shall constitute the like offence and be subject to the like punishment if it occurs on Anzac Day, or within the corresponding hours on Anzac Day, as the case may be, respectively.
